Crocodile tears preceded the "sympathetic" Council's conclusion that although the trailer community's plight is sad, there is nothing the Council can do about it—rules, you know. and the Council has no power over private property/business owners.

Really? The City Manager said that their agency is charged with making and enforcing the rules. This being true, the city does indeed wield immense power over private property/business owners--if the city council chooses to use it. Restaurants, for instance, are privately owned but they are bound by health and building codes, and they do business only if the city issues them a permit to do so. No smoking regulations, limits on occupancy, availability of alcohol, and a host of other regulations can be and are imposed on private business, all depending on the integrity of government regulators.

So why does the Des Moines City Council claim they are powerless to protect the vulnerable? Because they are vulnerable: The poor don't have dollars and without dollars, they have no clout. The elderly have no clout because of their diminished physical and mental capacity. Vulnerable Elderly unprotected by government are at the mercy of profit vultures who swoop down to pick their bones clean of property and financial resources accumulated over a lifetime.

That's life in a society that values Profits over People. Kind of like a jungle, isn't it? Very Darwinian. Not a pleasant life for the "Have Nots" at the mercy of the greedy "Haves."
