2016 LEGISLATIVE OVERVIEW


SB 5504/HB 1801 – Would have exempted the City from paying harbor fees to DNR for lease of aquatic lands , giving Des Moines (and Oak Harbor) the same treatment that public port districts currently enjoy.



Capital Budget Request – Requested funds from Capital Budget for needed renovations to the Des Moines Marina.



Issues affecting Des Moines and other Cities– Funding for ultrafine particulate study included in operating budget, no hit to shared city revenues, PRA reform bill passes.



HOUSE BILL 1801

State of Washington 65th Legislature 2017 Regular Session

By Representatives Hayes, Orwall, Smith, and Gregerson

Read first time 01/30/17. Referred to Committee on Environment.

SB 5504/HB 1801 – Would have exempted the City from paying harbor fees to DNR for lease of aquatic lands, giving Des Moines (and Oak Harbor) the same treatment that public port districts currently enjoy. Co-sponsored by Reps. Orwall and Gregerson in House. Senate version prime sponsored by Sen. Keiser

SB 5504 / HB 1801

WHAT HAPPENED

This bill advanced out of the committee of origin in the House, but did not make it past the fiscal committee due to fairness concerns raised by private marina owners, and DNR's opposition to the fiscal impact that the bill would have on their agency.



CAPITAL BUDGET REQUEST

What was the request for?

\$6,000,000 was requested from the Capital Budget for renovations to the Des Moines Marina.

Request met several key criteria. Renovating marina helps preserve and expand public access to Puget Sound. City had already invested significant funds in project.


CAPITAL BUDGET REQUEST

Success!

\$2,000,000 was included in the first Senate proposed budget.

Unfortunately, it was not included in first version of House Capital Budget. Reps. Orwall and Gregerson advocated within their caucus to ultimately fund project.

Several other Des Moines area capital budget funded projects that had initially been left out of House version of budget were ultimately included in negotiated capital budget, including: \$500,000 for Redondo Beach Rocky Reef building project, and \$100,000 for Wesley Homes.



CAPITAL BUDGET REQUEST

So... where is the money?

Budget impasse reached over legislation relating to water rights. Supreme Court's "Hirst" decision negatively impacted development and access to water in Eastern Washington and other rural areas.

Republicans refused to pass Capital Budget without fix to Hirst decision. Last minute deal was reached, but negotiations broke down and session adjourned.

60% vote required to pass Capital Budget because of bonding. Regardless of special election outcome, overall composition won't change enough to give either party 60% control.




OTHER LEGISLATIVE ITEMS

Limited PRA reforms, no hit to city shared revenues, and funding for study of ultrafine particulate.

The Legislature passed a limited consensus bill to deal with those who abuse the Public Records Act for profit, creating headaches for public agencies. Specifically, the bill allows agencies to charge requesters for staff time spent gathering digital records.

Despite early talks from Republicans that their version of the budget would include drastic hits to shared revenues with municipalities, the final adopted operating budget left shared revenue intact.

Funding for a study on the effects of ultrafine particulate was also funded in the state operating budget. This idea was originally brought forward by Sen. Keiser and Rep. Orwall.




ISSUES ON THE HORIZON

Threat to local transportation revenue, shared revenue

Initiative 947 would cap car tab fees at \$30 and significantly reduce state and local funding for transportation projects. The initiative would also dramatically cut funding to Sound Transit. These cuts would endanger voter approved ST3 projects. **Wipes out revenue from Des Moines TBD.**

Raiding shared city revenue continues to be an option for some budget writers.

LEVY SWAP AND EFFECT ON DES MOINES

Levy Swap – The idea that the legislature would increase the state property tax for public schools, take money people pay now in local school taxes and redistribute it statewide, while in turn reduce and limit the taxes people pay to local school districts.




EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PHASES




- ▶ Process – 4 days of classes including




WHAT DID WE LEARN

 - ▶ St. Francis Hospital
