

Purpose and Recommendation:

The purpose of this agenda item is to review the StART process and for City Council to determine the City’s relationship to StART moving forward.

Suggested Motion

MOTION: “I move to direct the City Manager to inform the Port of Seattle that the City will be rejoining the StART Committee effective immediately.”

Background: Last summer, 2019 the City Council approved a motion temporarily suspending participation in the StART Committee as a result of the Port of Seattle Commission moving forward with design and expenditures associated with the Sustainable Airport Master Plan and that this Port action was conducted outside the parameters of the SAMP environmental review. The cities of Burien and Federal Way also temporarily suspended participation on the StART.

This item will review the current status of discussions with the other cities and the Airport in regards to potentially returning to the StART process.

Alternatives: City Council will consider the viability of returning to StART or of not returning at this time.

Financial Impact: No financial impact other than dedication of staff time to this process if City Council approves a motion to return to StART.

Recommendation/Conclusion: City Manager recommends moving forward to rejoin StART. It was appropriate to temporarily suspend participation last summer and it is appropriate at this time, based on a number of changes/improvements to the StART process, to move forward and rejoin StART.

UPDATE ON AVIATION ISSUES

- ▶ Temporary withdrawal from the Sea-Tac Aviation Round Table (StART).
- ▶ In July, 2019, the Port Commission passed design work for several projects associated with the Sustainable Airport Master Plan.
- ▶ Several Cities, including Burien, Des Moines and Federal Way felt this action undermined our Cities' trust in the StART process and therefore we temporarily suspended participation in the StART.
- ▶ In fact, actions taken by the Port, out of context with the SAMP, are part of a larger issue our City has formally commented on of the Port dividing up the SAMP and not identifying cumulative impacts.

PROCESS

- ▶ In September, 2019, Cities of Burien, Des Moines and Federal Way held a joint Aviation Advisory Committee meeting to review the Cities status with regards to StART.
- ▶ In November a follow up joint meeting was held and identified outstanding issues associated with the StART.
- ▶ In December a meeting was held at the Port with the Mayors, City Managers, several Port Commissioners, Port Executive Director Metruck and Aviation Director Lance Lyttle to discuss the Cities concerns.
- ▶ A follow up meeting was held in January, 2020, between City Managers and Aviation Director Lyttle to once again review any opportunities for progress coming from the StART.

SUMMARY

- ▶ This briefing tonight will serve as the foundation to a more extensive discussion I would like to hold with Council on March 12th, at which time City Council can review appropriate action relative to the possibility of rejoining the StART process.
- ▶ Other Cities, including Burien and Federal Way are holding similar briefings with their City Council's to determine their Cities appropriate action.

Purpose and Recommendation

The purpose of this item is to seek City Council direction on the disposition of the existing residential structure at Van Gasken Sound View Park. Removal of the residential structure is recommended due to the multiple challenges and costs discussed below related to retaining the residence.

Suggested Motion

Motion 1: "I move to direct administration to remove the existing residential structure at the Van Gasken property in order to provide an enhanced public view, open green space and other public amenities for the park".

Background

Van Gasken Park is located at 402 South 222nd St and is roughly .66 acres in size with two structures. The main house was built in 1889 and the detached roughly 1,200 sq. ft. garage was built around 1960. The City, through cooperation and partnership with Forterra, purchased the property in late 2017. Quick

action was crucial by Forterra to help purchase the property before it could turn into a development project. Forterra's President stated: "Forterra is committed to securing the keystone places that our Pacific Northwest needs for a sustainable future. That includes places of beauty and recreation, and there are few better in the region than the old Van Gasken estate. We are eager to work with Des Moines and its people to make this a flagship park for the City and the region." Forterra purchased the property for \$1.2 million, and the City was given a 3 year timeframe to pay them back. The City was awarded \$273,720 in RCO grant funds and \$594,000 in CFT grant funds for the acquisition, so the City has invested around \$300,000 in addition to design costs for development of the park. Funding was provided primarily through two grant awards, from King County Conservation Futures Tax (CFT) and the State Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO). Design work for the development of Van Gasken Sound View Park is currently underway. On July 11, 2019 the City Council approved removal of the garage structure and the City is currently working to secure permits for that removal.

This Park has the potential to provide unparalleled views of the Sound, expand an existing waterfront recreation area by providing a connection to our waterfront parks, and is a much anticipated addition to the community.

The City's grant agreement with RCO originally required a decision on the disposition of the house by June 1, 2020. Council consideration of this item was delayed due to necessary cultural resources work, coordination with the tribes, RCO, and the State Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation, as well as the limitations on council meetings imposed by the Governor due to the pandemic.

The City has applied for an additional \$500,000 grant for park development from RCO. RCO has indicated a decision on the structure is required by mid-July, and that consideration of our new grant application will be negatively impacted without a decision, since this is an outstanding item on our existing grant agreement.

The City's consultant is currently completing a rendering of the park without the residential structure (Exhibit 2). This will be transmitted to the Council once complete, and is anticipated prior to the July 9th City Council meeting.

Discussion

The following considerations relate to the decision regarding the disposition of the house, as discussed below.

Historic Evaluation

A Historical Property Inventory/cultural resources evaluation for the property was completed by the City's consultants Environmental Science Associates and NW Vernacular who specifically evaluated the historical value of the house. The results of the study determined that the house is not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) or for designation as a King County Landmark. King County believes the house could be eligible for designation as a Des Moines community landmark due to its prominent location on the bluff. This designation recognizes the property but does not provide any enforceable protection. These findings are based on the extent of previous alterations and loss of integrity, as the design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association have been altered. The State Department of Historic Preservation, RCO, and King County Historic Preservation Office all concur with these findings.

RCO Grant

All structures on property acquired with RCO grants must be removed unless RCO determines the structure is allowed as essential to the operation and maintenance of the site. RCO would make a determination based on a request for approval of the use. There are few available options for use of the structure that might be approvable. Restrooms or necessary park-related storage are among uses that RCO might consider. Rental as a residence, museums, office space or an events venue that would allow for weddings or other gatherings are not approved uses. Should the City desire to retain the structure for non-park use, our existing grant award would be recalculated and significantly reduced by RCO based on a new appraisal completed at the City's expense.

Renovation, Maintenance, Removal Costs

The capital investment cost to rehabilitate the house at Van Gasken Park to retain it is high, depending upon the chosen use, in addition to the grant reduction if a non-approved use is desired. It is assumed that it would be difficult to complete a renovation for less than \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 based on past restoration projects in the City. The house does not meet current codes for public occupancy or accessibility, and vacant structures lead to issues with vandalism and safety. Operation and maintenance costs would add on-going expenses.

Demolition is significantly less expensive, expected to be between \$30,000 and \$50,000, and the grant award would not be reduced.

Park Design

Both the acquisition of the property, and the subsequent plans for development into a park are supported by and have consistent collaboration with local Native American Tribes. There is a potential for a further collaboration with the Snoqualmie Tribe to create artwork by one of the Tribes' carvers for the site.

Removal of the house, returning the site to its original pre-settlement condition would open up spectacular views of Puget Sound, adding to the City's green space and allowing the wider community increased access to this beautiful view property. The conceptual plan for the park development includes walking trails, gathering spaces, a viewing platform and interpretive signage.

A design element could be incorporated to create a viewing platform/deck on the residential foundation, with or without a roof, creating an amazing view gathering spot for the community. Interpretive signage could be developed to document the history of the place, both Native American and more recent history, including the occupancy by the Van Gasken family. If feasible we will repurpose materials from the house that may be incorporated into a commemorative design that would honor the history of the property while looking forward and serving the community in this unique place.

Summary

Weighing all the information above related to cost, grant requirements, ineligibility for historic landmark listing, loss of integrity of the structure, and the potential for increased park space, view and access, staff recommends that the house be demolished as the development of the park proceeds.

Alternatives

The Council could decide to retain the house and identify a desired use. Staff would request approval from RCO, and the grant amount would be reduced if an ineligible use.

Financial Impact

Retaining the residence: The existing residence is not usable in its current condition and would require significant capital investment to renovate. Renovation costs are not known at this time, as there is no permitted and identifiable use of the building. Maintenance and operations expenses would be ongoing.

Our existing RCO grant would be significantly reduced if an ineligible use is identified.

Demolition: Cost of demolition is anticipated to be in the range of \$30,000 to \$50,000.

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Council approve the suggested motion.




Conceptual Plan

Comment	Des Moines City Council -

This comment expresses opposition to the removal of the Van Gasken House, per Item 4 on the July 9, 2020, DES MOINES CITY COUNCIL STUDY SESSION.

First, While I certainly could have missed the public discussion regarding this issue, I could not find evidence of how the public was consulted regarding the removal of this historic home. As an asset owned by the public to be used for the benefit of the public, it seems that the public should be given ample opportunity to understand the reasoning behind taking the action, including what alternatives were considered, a cost-benefit analysis of each option, and then be given adequate

notice to respond. While some details are included in the packet, there has not been adequate time given to review, ask questions, and respond.

Second, as the property was purchased from the Van Gasken family, some of whom continue to live in and serve the community of Des Moines, it seems very inconsiderate that the family was not formally notified of the impending vote and possible action. Had the family been aware that the City of Des Moines intended to remove the structure, would the land have been sold outside the family? Could the city not take the time and make the effort to negotiate with the family over an appropriate way to honor the family, rather than surprising them in the eleventh hour with this proposal?

Third, the reading of the materials gives the impression that while creating a more open view is given as the primary reason for removing the structure, the monetary considerations were actually the driving force behind the decision. While the use of public funds should be an important consideration, it should be claimed as the reason if it is a driver in making the decision.

Finally, in the middle of a pandemic health crisis that brings with it subsequent financial strain for the city of Des Moines and its residents, is the removal of a structure at a park the pressing issue that should be considered at this time? Is the grant driving the sense of urgency to make a decision? Without the pressure from the timing required in the grant application, would this issue be considered at this time? But tearing down the Van Gasken house would destroy the opportunity to create a one-of-a-kind cultural gem in Des Moines and leave a lasting legacy for future generations.

I've read through the paperwork associated with the issue and at first I hesitated even to write, as it seems that the structure is doomed by significant restoration costs on one hand, and lack of interest by state and county historical preservationists on the other.

I regret that I wasn't aware of this issue sooner, as my job with SoCoCulture entails providing cultural connections and promotion throughout South King County - and here I was, unaware of what was happening in my own hometown until just a few days ago! Still, I wanted to make you aware of a resource that I did not see mentioned in the rationale for tearing the house down, and that might give you an opportunity to reconsider the possibilities for retaining the house.

First let me say that for me, as well as for many other locals, the Van Gasken House has been an iconic and enduring landmark for Des Moines, representing a modest architecture and scale that earlier city councils and city planners allowed to be overwhelmed elsewhere along Des Moines' waterfront by a wall of condominiums. The Van Gasken house is humble, but it is romantic, too - hearkening back to a time when Des Moines' waterfront was a beach, and reminding us of an earlier history of mosquito fleets and clam diggers and robust salmon runs.

While demolishing the Van Gasken house might be the easiest thing to do, that doesn't necessarily make it the right thing to do. The house, if properly restored, could offer a cultural gathering place - home to a revolving artist residency program perhaps, and/or a branch office/cultural center for environmental groups such as Trout Unlimited, Forterra, or the Muckleshoot/Duwamish tribes that once had free access to these beaches, and I think still have some treaty rights associated with the tideflats that remain here.

If you were to explore that latter case, there may well be some funding available through tribal coffers to help realize this vision. And for any scenario, I want to be sure that you're aware of [4Culture's Building for Equity](#) program that is open RIGHT NOW and that is offering grants of up to \$25,000 that could go a significant way toward funding the repair/remodel of the space so that it would be suitable for cultural programming in a sustainable, long-term manner. This 4Culture fund prioritizes organizations located in, and providing services to, historically underserved communities within King County - and Des Moines is certainly one of those communities. You would have to move with alacrity to apply for this grant, but it is certainly within the window of possibility.

I encourage this 2020 iteration of the City Council to have the vision to preserve a structure which, even though it doesn't have the blessing of the so-called preservation professionals, still does hold a strong place in the hearts of Des Moines residents and in the history of our town. It would be regrettable if you voted to tear the house down without first exploring all of the options.

And please, feel free to use me as a resource whenever you have cultural questions. If I don't know the answers immediately, I will try to find someone who does.

It is with great disappointment that I have only recently learned that the Council will be voting on a motion to dispose of the historic Van Gasken homestead located at Sound View Park above the Marina. I am deeply disappointed for this vote to be taking place, particularly in the midst of the COVID crisis, when we are unable to meet in person to discuss this and our time and attention is turned toward other important matters of life and death.

I see that the stated purpose of the demolition is to provide "enhanced public view, open green space and other public amenities." However, I believe we are blessed in Des Moines with many large spaces of stunning views. The footprint of this house does not take away from our view, but is an iconic landmark of the city.

As a close friend of the Van Gasken family, I have spent many July 4 evenings on the homestead property and can personally attest to the large amount of open space currently available on the property. We easily had dozens of people seated just in the side yard next to the front entrance. That does not even count large open spaces to the south and to the north, with other buildings that could be removed to create more open space, if truly necessary. This does not even count the hillsides surrounding the property to the west and north.

Dear City of Des Moines Council Members,

My husband and I moved to Des Moines from the Midwest in 2016 because of the City's proximity to the Puget Sound, as well as the revitalization potential that could be realized by blending the abundant natural resources with the City's cultural heritage. While we are still relatively new to this area, we bring with us a deep respect for the power of local history to draw a community together.

I am compelled to write to you now as you will be discussing the future plans for the Van Gasken property at the City Council meeting on July 9, 2020. I have been following the public record of information pertaining to this property for the last several years. The City's success negotiating with Forterra to secure funding that would "protect the property from future [multi-family residential] development" was

a major accomplishment. (Source: King County Conservation Futures [CFT] 2019 Annual Collections Application for Funds, https://your.kingcounty.gov/dnrp/library/water-and-land/stewardship/conservation-futures/applications/2018/cities/DesMoines_VanGaskenPropertyWaterfrontOS.pdf)

While I understand that the focus has been on preservation of the site and not necessarily the original Van Gasken home, I am requesting that the Council consider the following questions during your discussion about the disposition of the home:

1. The City of Des Moines funded a stewardship and preservation engagement with the following organizations: the Des Moines Historical Society, the Des Moines Landmarks Commission, the King County Historic Preservation Office, Department of Archeology and Historic Preservation and Tribes, the Friends of Des Moines Creek. Presumably this work was done, in part, with taxpayer funds.

What are the conclusions and outcomes of this intensive effort? At the very least, community members should be provided with an opportunity to understand and comment on the findings of this work. ^{SEP}

2. Have you made a serious attempt to tap into the experience, skills and energy of community members to collaborate with you in an effort to preserve the home?

I would hope that creative options to repurpose the Van Gasken home would be given careful consideration. If a purposeful renovation/reuse on the existing site is not financially feasible, perhaps the home could be relocated to another more suitable site. The CFT grant application mentions the opportunity to develop the property as an educational/interpretive center. This should, of course, encompass both the archaeological significance of the early use of the site by Native American tribes and the eventual exploration and settlement of the site by some of the City's first residents. Community members have suggested other potential uses for the home that aren't dependent upon maintaining it in situ, such as leasing it to an organization that could host an artist- or musician-in-residence or as an extension of our local history museum.

There are precious few structures remaining from Des Moines' early days. Demolition of such a visible and iconic landmark would be a tragedy and should only be considered after all other reasonable options have been exhausted. I urge you to think about the enduring impressions left on the community if you bulldoze history.



Property is .67 Acre


Owner inquired if the city was interested in the residential structure only (without the land) in approximately 2015

Property was then offered for sale in 2017 by the family trust

Offer from a developer was accepted by the trust, submitted to the City for a pre-application meeting - private multi-family development.

Original sale to developer fell through

City made offer for the property, with intention to seek grant funds



Van Gasken Sound View Park Background

Forterra purchased the property on behalf of the City in late 2017, preventing loss of the view site to development and furthering Forterra's goals of creating urban open space and public access.

City had three years to reimburse Forterra for the purchase.

Goals of City acquisition:

- Prevent imminent threat of loss to intense development of the site
- Create public gathering place
- Increase access to Puget Sound viewpoints for the broader Des Moines community
- Connect surrounding public open spaces (missing link)



Van Gasken Sound View Park Background

Since the acquisition, multiple discussions have occurred related to plans for the park and structures

Initial design concept rendering presented to the City Council September 6, 2018

Covered shelter concept, house removed

This was also presented to the community at the Marina area redevelopment public input meeting Sept 19, 2019 at the Des Moines Yacht Club

Option for removal/view area at least two years





Van Gasken Sound View Park

Background

City was successful in obtaining two grants for the acquisition:

\$594,000 - King County Conservation Futures Grant (CFT) - funds received
\$273,720 - State Recreation Conservation Office Grant (RCO) - pending receipt
\$332,000 - City funds
TOTAL = \$1.2 M

Reality is that without these grants, the property would not have been able to be purchased by the City. Likely development into multifamily units, precluding public access and views if the property had remained in the private sector

RCO acquisition grant requires structures to be removed except in limited circumstances approved by RCO as essential to the operation of the site

Decision on the residential structure due to RCO in mid July (acquisition grant)

Structure Considerations – Historical Evaluation

➤ Garage

- City Council previously approved removal of the 1960's garage, the area will be incorporated into the site planning potential disabled parking spaces

➤ Residence

- Historical resource consultant evaluated the residence
- Determined not eligible for listing - either National or King County Landmark due to loss of integrity, multiple and significant previous alterations
- Agreement with these findings by RCO, King County, and State Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation (DAHP)

Structure Considerations – RCO Grants

Secured acquisition grant of \$273,720:

- Structures required to be removed, with few exceptions
- Decision by mid-July (extended from June 1)
- If Council chooses to retain the structure, identify use and seek approval from RCO
- Very few uses are possible: restrooms, park storage for the site might be approvable
- Not approvable – meeting or office space, event/wedding venue, museum, residence
- If not an approved use, grant amount reduction

Structure Considerations – RCO Grants

New 2020 grant application (\$500,000) for park creation/public access/landscaping/viewpoints:

- This new grant application would be negatively impacted without a decision regarding the structure (either removal or approved use)
- Without this project, the site would remain closed to the public as unsuitable for public access in current condition
- Grant funds needed to complete the park



Structure Considerations - Costs

Costs of structure renovation:

- Building does not meet codes for public occupancy or ADA accessibility
- Would need extensive renovation, hazardous materials abatement, mechanical/plumbing systems, structural alterations/repairs
- Improving the structure to an acceptable use is expensive, based on past experience, up to \$1M
- On-going maintenance costs (older building)
- In addition to potential loss of grant funds

Removal significantly less expensive:

- 30K to 50K expected demolition
- Prudent use of public funds has never been more important – impact of pandemic on budget

Structure Considerations – Park Design

- Removal of house would open up an outstanding view area, increasing access to this spectacular view for the entire community
- Utilize foundation area for view platform with or without roof – could be utilized for gatherings, picnics etc.
- View platform would increase access, and usable area of the park
- Avoid vandalism and crime associated with vacant structures

Ways to honor the past while also looking to the future to best serve the community

- Re-purpose materials as feasible
- Interpretive signage regarding the history of the area
- Close collaboration with tribes on the park design and protection of cultural resources
- Working with DAHP, RCO and tribes to design the project to avoid impacts and enhance, protect and interpret
- Return site to its original pre-settlement condition
- Possibility of incorporating cultural artwork

Recommendation

Weighing all the information related to costs, grant requirements, loss of integrity of the structure, ineligibility for historic landmark listing, and the potential for increased view, park space, usability and access, staff recommends removal of the residence as part of the public park design.
